Welcome and Opening Remarks by Dr. Ramandeep Kaur Chhina, Conference Chair, Course Director UNITAR & Assistant Professor, Heriot-Watt University.

Short Profile of Dr. Ramandeep Chhina: Dr. Ramandeep Chhina is an Assistant Professor of Business law at Heriot-Watt University, Edinburgh and is also an On-board Consultant with the United Nations Institute for Training and Research (UNITAR, Geneva). She did her BA (Laws), LLB and LLM from Guru Nanak Dev University, India and her second masters (MSt in Legal Research) and doctorate (DPhil) from the University of Oxford, UK. She is a qualified advocate in India and also a qualified non-practising solicitor of England and Wales, UK. Dr. Chhina is a certified financial crime specialist (CFCs) and her research interests are in the area of transnational commercial law and financial crime. With UNITAR, Dr. Chhina is involved, as a course director, in designing, developing and tutoring courses on anti-money laundering, anti-corruption, public finance management, multilateral trade negotiations and good governance. In April 2014, she delivered a training seminar to Belgian Development Agency (BTC) in Belgium on the evolution of public financial management controls. Previously, she also worked on the USAID funded project in West Bank (Palestine) as a consultant and advised the Palestinian ministry on developing a regulatory framework for monitoring the movement and production of precious metals in the territory. Dr. Chhina did practice as a solicitor in the business crime department of a law firm in UK and particularly handled multi-million money laundering cases. She is also currently involved in delivering Continuing Professional Development (CPD) courses to solicitors in UK on UK's anti-money laundering regime and Professional Ethics.

For short stay trips the City Centre Car Parks offer great convenience, but for longer visits there are five world class Park & Ride sites located on the outskirts of the City that provide free parking and a swift and frequent bus ride to the City Centre.

Things to DO in Cambridge

Number 1: see Cambridge University colleges in broad daylight

Take a walking tour in the historical city to absorb the sights of its medieval colleges. Imagine dozens of colleges which all belong to the umbrella of the University of Cambridge. The colleges have their own private lives too, but each college is part of the Cambridge University. If you are squeezed by time, or you want to get a general overview of the city of Cambridge, get on a hop on hop off bus and enjoy the informative audio tour in many languages. The highlights of the Cambridge University tour could be many of the colleges, but surely **Kings College** and **Trinity College**. Visit the King's College Chapel at Evensong to listen to the choir and gasp at the beauty of the cathedral sized 'chapel'.

Number 2: taking a boat tour on the River Cam, aka Punting in Cambridge

The gondola like flat bottomed boats are called punts, and taking punting tours are showing you another side of the city of Cambridge, the back of the colleges where the river Cam runs, simply called **The Backs**. The punting tours also include guidance and lots of fun anecdotes about Cambridge. Relaxing and definitely a must do in Cambridge. Punting tours are excellent on lazy summer days, but spring and autumn punters get blankets to shield them from the chilly weather. You will glide under the **Bridge of Sighs** by **St John's College**, as well as the **Mathematical Bridge**.

Number 3: the Fitzwilliam Museum, the art and history gem of Cambridge

Fitzwilliam Museum is not only free to visit (yes, it is totally free), but it is also a perfect little museum where you have seen everything within an hour, but still feel enriched with beauty and history. The museum has a nice cafe and a good souvenir shop to buy little Cambridge gifts.

Number 4: the Orchard – Tea House amongst Apple trees

The Orchard is a special English tea house. As the name suggests, the tea house tables and sun chairs are among the apple trees, plus there is a glass house in case you should come to Cambridge on a rainy day. We warmly recommend the fresh scones with teas. Meditative and relaxed atmosphere. Enjoy life, lean back, have a good chat. A favourite hangout of Cambridge students, locals, and tourists alike.

Number 5: the University Botanical Garden, plants, trees, nature

Natural beauty is abundant in the University Botanical Gardens, which is ideal for romantic couples, or families with children. Best in the summer time.

Number 6: Science and Tech Museums

There are various science and technology museums all over the city of Cambridge, so we will not pick one for you, but will present the major options: the [Sedgwick Museum of Earth Sciences](#), the [Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology](#), the [Museum of Zoology](#), the [Whipple Museum of the History of Science](#), the [Museum of Classical Archaeology](#)

Number 7: Scott Polar Research Institute

Humans are tough beings, with strong inner drives to explore the unknown. The [The Polar Museum](#) tells the stories of the polar explorers, who ventured into the North Pole and the South Pole. Diaries, grim photos, fateful trips to the Arctic and Antarctic regions.

Number 8: The Round Church Visitor Centre

The Round Church is not functioning as a church any more, but is open to visitors who delight in the painted glass windows, and of course the Round Church built in 1130 by the Normans (arriving from France in 1066). While most churches you can see in Europe are cross shaped, this is one of the handful of medieval churches which has a round shape (influenced by the round church of Jerusalem). The church is today a visitor centre and the hub of the Christian Heritage.

Number 9: Great St Mary's Church, the Catholic Church of Cambridge

Climbing to the top of the Catholic Church is one of the highest point you can get in Cambridge to see the city from a bit higher above. Besides the exceptional views, you can learn about the history of the old Catholic church, where once even Erasmus preached.

Number 10: Art in Cambridge

[Kettle's Yard](#) is one of the finest art galleries in the United Kingdom featuring modern and contemporary arts of work, and very nice [concerts](#) too! [Cambridge Arts Centre](#) and the [Cambridge Arts Picture House](#) should also be on your artsy things to do in Cambridge. The former is a small theatre with very nice performances, while the latter is a retro style movie theatre / cinema.
